#### **Engagement Methods**

Determining appropriate ways to engage stakeholders and community participants can help ensure agency during a project. Through the potential of participatory action, communities are empowered to join in democratic decision making to establish their priorities, define their goals, and build consensus. The designer or design team can function as a facilitator to engage participation. This role requires neutrality—respect for an unbiased and objective process that honors the social and cultural context of the community or audience. Read more.

# Public Interest Design Principles:

- Principle 1: Advocate with those who have a limited voice in public life.
- Principle 2: Build structures for inclusion that engage stakeholders and allow communities to make decisions.
- Principle 3: Promote social equality through discourse that reflects a range of values and social identities.



# Public Interest Design Principles (cont'd):

- Principle 4: Generate ideas that grow from place and build local capacity.
- Principle 5: Design to help conserve resources and minimize waste.

Part 1 is intended to provide an introduction to the project and therefore information should be brief yet descriptive of the qualities most relevant to the nature of the work and those involved.

## PART 2: PROJECT DETAILS


Part 2 builds upon the content submitted in Part 1 by providing the opportunity to elaborate on and/or modify that information. This section allows reviewers to understand the project in terms of background research, design process, extent of stakeholder participation, as well as progress made towards stakeholder goals in more depth.

## PART 3: PROJECT RESULTS

This final section requests an analysis of the project results including an assessment of performance measures and met goals. Reflection on knowledge gained during the scope of project and what could have been done differently punctuates the conclusion of the SEED Evaluator.


